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1) Introduction

The Neighbourhood Development Plan process will provide residents, businesses, service providers and local organisations with a unique opportunity to help guide development within the parish, plan the future delivery of local services and facilities, and

ensure that Barrow upon Soar remains a vibrant and sustainable place to live, work, and do business.

To support the successful development of Barrow upon Soar Neighbourhood Plan, the RCC was commissioned by Barrow upon Soar Parish Council to organise and independently facilitate a meeting of key local stakeholders which was held on 24th March 2015 at the Humphrey Perkins School, Cotes Road, Barrow upon Soar.

The meeting was held in order to:

- *Raise awareness of the Barrow upon Soar Neighbourhood Plan among key local stakeholders.*
- *Identify opportunities and constraints related to the future development and delivery of services, facilities and infrastructure within the parish.*
- *Contribute to the core evidence base for the Barrow upon Soar Neighbourhood Plan.*
- *Identify and explore key issues that the Neighbourhood Plan will need to consider*
- *Help to inform the ongoing consultation and engagement process required to produce the plan*

5) Issues and Opportunities Workshop - Results

Facilitated discussion took place within six groups:

Each group looked at the key issues and opportunities for consideration within the Barrow upon Soar Neighbourhood Plan.

They were all asked the same series of questions:

1. What is your interest in Barrow upon Soar?
2. How are the needs of your business/ group/ organisation being met in the Parish at the moment?
3. What are the difficulties in running your business/ group/ organisation in the Parish?
4. What challenges does your business/ group/ organisation face that you would like to see the Neighbourhood Plan address?
5. Can you see specific infrastructure needs?
6. Can you see that your business/ group/ organisation are likely to put pressure on elements of the character of the parish.
7. Can you see specific land use needs?

Tables 4 -12 detail the key points recorded under topic headings; parking, assets/ amenities, young people, challenges, access, infrastructure, opportunities, new development and land use.

Table 4: Issues & Opportunities – Parking:

Parking
Plenary Feedback - Key Issues
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Since the loss of parking at ‘The Three Crowns’ and parking limited to one hour at the Coop (as opposed to two hours) parking or rather the lack of it has become a prime issue for businesses, community groups Barrow Baptist and the Holy Trinity Churches. • Congestion outside the Primary School at ‘drop off’ and ‘pick up’ times. • Restricted parking for Glebe Allotments. Fast stretch of road, therefore turning in or out of the site is dangerous. • Car parking for retail outlets and Medical Centre is a problem. • On street parking: according to questionnaire response, there is a perception that emergency vehicles have problems accessing areas of the village because of inconsiderate parking. Leicestershire Fire & Rescue are unaware of any issues. If an area is identified as having a problem, that can take steps to address it. • More consideration should be given to parking provision on new developments. • The restriction in parking time at the Coop site has resulted in a ‘fall off’ in trade. Shoppers should be encouraged to browse the shops, have a coffee etc, instead they are continually checking their watches for fear of a parking fine. • Could the current medical centre be demolished and the site used for car parking? • Could a developer provide a multipurpose building that could accommodate the library amongst other facilities? Demolish existing library and use the site for parking? • Baptist Church congregation includes people from outside village, the disabled etc all need car parking provision. • Problems with staff parking at primary school. • Planning considers road networks but doesn’t address parked cars etc, causing blockages/ issues. LCC NPPF has made it difficult to object to Planning applications on Highways grounds without demonstrating ‘severity’ which has no agreed definition. • Lovely shops, but insufficient parking, no encouragement for new businesses to move in.

<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Allotment, threat of sale of the site,• The Health Centre is overstretched, not sufficient Doctors.• Healthcare: misinformation, a vast improvement required. Insufficient trained staff, challenges from reception staff about why an early morning appointment is required.• Medical Centre closes for a half day.• It has been stated that the Medical Centre is 70% over subscribed, but the actual figure is thought to be closer to 90% oversubscribed.• Medical Centre, the current site is constrained and therefore expansion is limited, could a new Medical Centre be multifunctional?• Medical Centre: main issue is that it is not owned by the GP's.• Primary School class sizes will continue to increase.• Hall Orchard Primary School perceived to be oversubscribed and classes too large according to questionnaire returns. Leicestershire County Council will be asked to mitigate the negative response.• The NDP questionnaire returns indicated that 30% of respondents considered a purpose built community facility vital to the village and a further 50% thought it desirable. However there is a counter argument for the need of a purpose built community facility; income is required to keep other bodies/ buildings running in the village.• Does the medical Centre need to be central to the village or could it be moved elsewhere as long as it was on a bus route?• Retaining the library is a priority.• A purpose built community centre should be a priority.• Could more land be allocated for sport?• Barrow Baptist Church is in the middle of the conservation area, the building is too small, there are also problems with parking. Would like more community land for church and parking, and may be share the village hall?

- Medical Centre, expansion or new build?
- The school would like to encourage more community sport on its site.

<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Long waiting list for Guides, more volunteers required. • Waiting list for Play Group. • Anti- social behaviour- keeping kids off the streets could be difficult if volunteers aren't found. • The school would like more places to grow (unsure if this is planting or building expansion). • The school needs more housing (children) to flourish. • The Humphrey Perkins School have invested in fostering links with community groups, they would like to improve their own facilities. • A perception that Quorn and Barrow upon Soar schools are overstretched. • What facilities are there for young people?

Challenges
<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Lack of employment opportunities and 'start up' business opportunities. • The potential for empty shop units should be addressed. New businesses should compliment the existing shops as opposed to Estate Agents for example. • The closure of the bank has meant less passing trade and more reliance on the existing customer base for retail outlets. • More Neighbourhood Watch volunteers are required and closer liaison with the

Police regarding crime statistics.

- The property developers have faced past challenges in BuS, they would be prepared to contribute monies towards a community facilitator to work with new residents and encourage them to use local facilities.
- Funding from development comes after housing, so infrastructure not developed alongside. Developers are frustrated that funds are available but not going to the right place.
- It is difficult to support overstretched services and maintain those that are under used/ or closing.
- Need to improve road safety and reduce the problem parking; enforcement of basic rules.
- High Street (countrywide) are restrictive/ basic layout which are unadaptable/ hemmed in by housing.

<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Roberts Coaches are unable to access Mountsorrel from Barrow upon Soar for several weeks of the year when Slash Lane floods.• Slash Lane does not pose a problem to Leicestershire Fire & Rescue when it floods, their vehicles are designed to cope with flooding.• Inconsiderate parking on the High Street and on bus routes affects the bus service, it is difficult to stick to a timetable because of this factor generally, but particularly so at peak times. There are time tabling issues due to congestion on High Street.• A pedestrian crossing is needed in the vicinity of ‘The Blacksmith’s Arms’ and the library.• Stock deliveries to retail outlets on the High Street, is a real problem. Deliveries must come through the front door and yet there is nowhere for vans to park because parking bays have been removed and bollards installed.• More buses, less cars on the village roads, efficiency & safety should be prioritised.• Efficient transport in and out of village.• Neighbouring parishes experience transport issues, which are exacerbated during periods of flooding when getting between the parishes becomes difficult.

- No disabled access to train station, and it feels unsafe for loan travellers.
- No late or Sunday trains.
- Station needs to be more accessible and trains are full, funds needed to support development in these areas.
- Cycling to Barrow upon Soar is unsafe from Quorn/ Mountsorrel, also cycles cause issues for commercial vehicles; passing, getting held up, no roads/ no cycleway.
- There is likely to be less and less money for road improvements/ cycle provision. Spending will be directed at social/ health services. Also there is potential impact on subsidies such as trains and buses.

<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Internet band width now linked to ‘superfast’ broadband, but only available through one provider. • New developments need their own telecom green boxes. • The coordination of road closures and the utility companies would benefit High Street trade and affect the buses and timetables. • The current telephone exchange is in Quorn, 2- 3 miles away. • Will new developments be provided with superfast fibre? • Limited burial space, landowners unwilling to sell land for this purpose due to lower prices

<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Richard Erswell of East Midlands Trains would be happy to sit upon a ‘travel forum’ with Councillors and residents in order to discuss train timetables. Possibly meeting

every six months.

- The River has leisure development opportunities.

<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• The character of new houses should be more in keeping with the village, and there should be more open spaces/ gardens.• Against development in flood zones and flood plain.• Sensible development, consider how water courses are treated.• Sometimes development can bring benefits if managed well.• There seems to be a lack of willingness for major stakeholders to get involved.• More consideration should be given for housing for the elderly, more single storey homes and improved medical facilities.• Should include sheltered accommodation for the disabled, market housing and bungalows.• Transportation/ school places etc cause issues for developers limiting the ability to sell housing and reduces house prices.• Garages allocated for parking spaces in planning terms, but never used for purpose.• Materials for car parking areas to be given serious consideration; gravel drives might reduce run off.• New developments to incorporate micro regeneration, renewable, water saving, energy efficiency features.

<p>Plenary Feedback - Key Issues</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Need for business use/ to provide employment.• New Health Centre to accommodate influx of people.• New schools.• Car parking.• Potentially need to develop new villages rather than tagging on new development and infilling developments.• Sites for potential business are often developed for housing, need to protect areas for commercial/ business use. Promoting business to business support, the 'commercial core'.• The flip side of development, is that in order to support business, adequate housing development will be needed in outlying areas.• Can privately owned land be designated for protection/ use as burial space/ community use?• Allotments belong to the Diocese who is considering selling the land; do communities have the 'right to buy'?• Gardens in new housing are too small/ unsuitable for growing; shaded, poor soil quality, used for social space.

Encouraging communities to become more physically active through walking, cycling, informal recreation and formal sport plays an important part in this process and providing enough sports facilities of the right quality and type and in the right places is vital to achieving this aim. This means positive planning for sport, protection from unnecessary loss of sports facilities and an integrated approach to providing new housing and employment land and community facilities provision is important. It is important therefore that the Neighbourhood Plan reflects national policy for sport as set out in the above document with particular reference to Pars 73 and 74 to ensure proposals comply with National Planning Policy. It is also important to be aware of Sport England’s role in protecting playing fields and the presumption against the loss of playing fields (see link below), as set out in our national guide, ‘A Sporting Future for the Playing Fields of England – Planning Policy Statement’.</p>

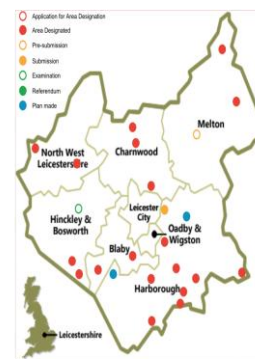
